William Medway D.V.M., Ph.D. 1927 - 2006

Dr. William Medway, emeritus professor of clinical laboratory medicine in the Department of Clinical Studies at the University of Pennsylvania School of Veterinary Medicine, died unexpectedly on March 19, 2006. He was 79.

Dr. Medway was a pioneer in the field of aquatic animal medicine and collaborated on much of the early clinical research on whales, dolphins, and manatees in the 1960's, 1970's, and 1980's. He was a charter and honorary life member of the International Association for Aquatic Animal Medicine (IAAAM) and was a teacher, mentor, friend, and colleague to generations of veterinarians. In 1999 the IAAAM William Medway Award for Excellence in Teaching Aquatic Animal Medicine was initiated in his honor. Dr. Medway also served as the president of the IAAAM from 1974-1975 and as the organization's secretary/treasurer from 1969-1973. He edited the IAAAM Newsletter for 10 years and was a valuable source of archived material when a comprehensive CD of scientific abstracts was produced several years ago.

Dr. Medway was born on February 23, 1927 in Manitoba, Canada. He received a B.S. degree from the University of Manitoba in 1947 and worked as an instructor in the Department of Chemistry at the Ontario Veterinary College until the fall of 1949. He received his D.V.M. degree from the Ontario Veterinary College in 1954 and a Ph.D. degree from Cornell University in 1958 where his thesis focused on water metabolism in domestic fowl. Dr. Medway joined the University of Pennsylvania School of Veterinary Medicine faculty in 1959 as an assistant professor of clinical laboratory medicine and moved through the academic ranks to become professor of clinical laboratory medicine in 1968. He also spent time as a research associate and assistant professor in the department of physiological sciences at the Ontario Veterinary College from 1960-1962. Dr. Medway was the director of the clinical laboratory at the Veterinary Hospital of the University of Pennsylvania (VHUP) from 1958-1960 and chief of clinical laboratory medicine at VHUP from 1962-1979. He retired in 1988 after 30 years of dedicated service. Dr. Medway continued to collaborate and communicate with colleagues and students after his retirement.

Dr. Medway published more than 60 scientific papers that covered a variety of veterinary topics dealing with both domestic and wildlife species. He made strong and lasting scientific contributions to the areas of marine mammal anatomy and pathology, infectious diseases of marine mammals, marine mammal clinical pathology, domestic animal clinical pathology, canine cancer, canine kidney disease, parasitic diseases of North American domestic and wild mammals, and avian clinical pathology and physiology. Dr. Medway also co-authored (first author) the 1969 *Textbook of Veterinary Clinical Pathology* and contributed six book chapters to prestigious contributed works including the *Merck Veterinary Manual*, Fowler's *Zoo and Wildlife Medicine*, and Kirk's *Current Veterinary Therapy*.

Dr. Medway taught courses in clinical pathology, fish medicine, and zoo mammal medicine at the School of Veterinary Medicine and he lectured for many years on marine mammal medicine at the unique and prestigious Aquavet® program that is offered annually at the Marine Biological Laboratory in Woods Hole, MA. He also served as the faculty advisor for the School of Veterinary Medicine's student-run Wildlife Service for

over a decade and was a member of the School of Veterinary Medicine's admissions committee from 1983-1988.

Dr. Medway belonged to over a dozen professional and scientific societies and presented many invited lectures on topics dealing with marine mammal medicine and veterinary clinical pathology.

Dr. Medway was appointed to the U.S. Marine Mammal Commission Committee of Scientific Advisors in 1982 and served in this capacity until 1985. In 1988 he was reappointed to this committee and provided his services and expertise to the Marine Mammal Commission until 1995.

Dr. Medway is survived by his wife Carol; son Kendall; granddaughter Devon, and five brothers and sisters, Louise, Mary, Ann, Kathleen, and Peter.

INFORMATION FOR EVERYONE

- There seems to be some confusion with hotel reservations. In order to get the discounted conference rate and be counted against the room block, persons must follow the instructions that were listed on the website. You must use that extension or you will be sent to general reservations. Also, the reservations cannot be made on the Wyndham website. If you have made your reservations any way other than through Melonie, please email her at the address above with your reservations information and she will make sure you are moved to our room block and receive conference rates. Remember—deadline for hotel reservations to receive conference rates is March 27, 2006!

• The Bahamas is a foreign country for many. Coming Into the Bahamas – Travel Requirements: For visitors, entry requirements differ slightly depending upon place of birth, length of stay and what items accompany the traveler.

Upon your arrival to The Islands of The Bahamas, you will be asked to fill out an Immigration Arrival/Departure Card, which you will keep part of until your departure. The airlines usually distribute these cards, but they are also available in the Immigration area of the airport. You will then clear Immigration before proceeding to pick up your luggage. All visitors are required to be in possession of a return ticket. After picking up your luggage, you will proceed to customs. Please indicate that you are a visitor for a conference and that you are staying at the Wyndham/Crystal Palace Resort.

U.S. and Canadian citizens entering The Islands of The Bahamas as visitors are required to show proof of citizenship with either a passport (current or expired within five years) or two forms of identification, one of which has to have a photo. For example, you may bring your birth certificate and a driver's license.

British subjects from the United Kingdom and colonies may enter The Islands of The Bahamas as visitors without passports or visas for periods not exceeding three weeks. For longer stays they must present a passport.

All others need a valid passport.

A Yellow Fever vaccination certificate is required from travelers over one year of age coming from the following countries: Angola, Benin, Bolivia, Brazil, Burkina Faso, Colombia, Cameroon, Democratic Republic of Congo, Ecuador, French Guiana, Gabon, Gambia, Ghana, Guinea, Liberia, Nigeria, Sierra Leone, Peru and Sudan. Travelers are required to be vaccinated 10 days prior to entering The Islands of The Bahamas and must have a valid certificate of vaccination against Yellow Fever.

Dr. Donald Stremme has over 30 years experience in small animal and exotics practice, including 26 years managing his own practice. He has also been the veterinarian for the Adventure Aquarium and the Philadelphia Academy of Natural Sciences for almost 14 years. He graduated from Pennsylvania State University with a B.S. in Zoology and received his V.M.D. from the University of Pennsylvania. As an undergraduate he spent a semester at the University of Cologne in Germany. During veterinary school he worked summers at the University of Hohenheim near Stuttgart Germany, where he was responsible for water quality and the care of the many research animals from fish to raptors. He worked under Dr. Gottfried Schubert, a pioneer in fish husbandry and medicine. His externship during senior year was at the Wilhelma Zoo in Stuttgart. He recently translated a German book on the husbandry of venomous snakes into English for Krieger Publishing Company. He completed AquaVet II in 2000. Don has been an active member of IAAAM since 1996 and been an IAAAM board member for 5 years (serving as secretary/treasurer and then as treasurer).

Nomination for IAAAM Treasurer:

Born and raised in NYC, **Dr. Julius M. Tepper** graduated from York College of CUNY in 1971. He then went to Europe to study veterinary medicine, graduating with honors from the University de Liege in Brussels, Belgium in 1976. Returning that year to NYC, he began practicing and held a special interest in birds and exotic animals. He owns and has managed the Shirley Veterinary Hospital, a small and exotic animal practice on Long Island from 1982 to the present. After requests from clients, he opened the Long Island Fish Hospital in 1998, serving as a private practitioner for pet fish. Besides the IAAAM,

he is a member of the Long Island Veterinary Medical Association, where he has served on the executive board, as well as being a member of the Association of Reptile and Amphibian Veterinarians, Association of Avian Veterinarians, the New York State Veterinary Medical Society and the AVMA.

Dr. Judy St. Leger is the Director of Pathology for SeaWorld. Her work involves assuring population health and investigating morbidity and mortality in wild and collection animals. After thorough and thoughtful review of highly-qualified student applications for the 2006 IAAAM Student Travel Awards, the Student Liaison Committee recommended that each of the following four students be awarded \$500 to defray their costs for the upcoming conference:

- * Allison Tuttle, North Carolina State University: "Evaluation of the tissue reactions in the skin of the African-clawed water frog (*Xenopus laevis*) to five commonly used suture materials"

The RTLA archive contains tissue specimens, case histories, and images pertaining to greater than 7,600 case accessions that have been contributed from worldwide sources during the past forty years, as well as a collection of more than 7,300 reprints from scientific publications related to neoplastic disease in lower animals.

Thanks to funding by the NCI, consultation is provided at no cost to the contributor, and case submission forms and instructions are located on the RTLA Web page. In addition to consultation services, the RTLA provides tissue specimens for retrospective studies, participates in collaborative research, sponsors teaching workshops, and offers internship opportunities. Vaccines have been an effective preventative medicine tool for terrestrial agriculture and zoo and wildlife species for many years. Vaccines have been in use for commercially important aquacultured finfish as well, but their great potential has not been realized to any significant degree for ornamental/public aquaria species.

This workshop/session is intended to provide background information on current vaccine use in commercially important finfish, vaccine production methods, considerations for development of new vaccines, autogenous vs. commercial types, caveats and limitations, current and future technology, and how to start a vaccine program.
